'WHO'S FOR TENNIS: FIRST FIND THE BALLS

"We just can't make enough tennis balls to fill the demand," says Mr. Joseph J. White, assistant advertising manager of the American Dunlop Tyre and Rubber Co. - one of only three companies that manufacture tennis balls in the U.S.

"Tennis has come off its ivory tower," he said. "It has become a people's sport." The crowds at the U.S. Open Championships at Forest Hills this week underscore his point.

There are 13.5 million Americans playing tennis these days, and their number increases by one-half million annually, according to the U.S. Lawn Tennis Association.

The above report appeared recently in the "Financial Review" but the popularity of tennis is not restricted to America as here in Perth, metropolitan clubs are enthusiastic about the epening of the Season and no one could be more pleased than us as attendance of over 100 on each of the first two Saturdays gives evidence.
